This week's year group news...

Reception More scarecrow fun is on the cards as we enter next week. The children will continue to use a range of media and resources to create scarecrows, improving their cutting skills and exercising their imaginations. Enhanced learning will include an empathic look at the characters in 'The Scarecrow's Wedding' and considering what might be written in a speech bubble. Alongside this, the children will be exploring different ways of making the same total. Phonics will be j, v, y, w and th and our number of the week is 5. Alongside our 'Foundation five' activities , if you fancy some further challenges for the weekend, these could include zip practise and an exploration of ways that we can be kind. Thanks, as ever, for all of your support.

Year 1 The children have all really enjoyed learning about the Great Fire of London this week. We were impressed by their enthusiasm and ability to retain lots of facts. Next week, we will continue to learn a little more about this historic event and will learn all about Samuel Pepys. Our writing will, once again link to this topic. We are fortunate to have a lovely new construction resource called 'Kapla blocks' (they look a little bit like Jenga). We will begin to learn how to use this and will attempt to learn how to balance the blocks to be able to build London Bridge! Who knows, we could inspire some future architects in the class! In maths, we begin a new block on addition and subtraction. We will be using part-whole models which the children will have been familiar with from reception, especially when calculating their dinner numbers each morning. We will be building on their current knowledge to add by counting on and finding missing parts. Thank you for all your support in ensuring the children have their RWI folders in school on Mondays as this is when we aim to hear the children read individually (apologies - yet another thing to remember!) We wish you all a restful weekend.

Year 2 The children have really enjoyed learning about the Great Fire of London this week and they can already recall so many facts! They know where and how it started, why it spread so quickly and how London was rebuilt using different materials as a result. They have also used their creative skills to make their very own Fire Marks - ask them what this is! We have also continued to research London landmarks in Literacy lessons and compared numbers and objects during maths this week too. Next week, we will be learning the 2s, 5s, 10s and 3s times tables in depth. The children will be using the facts and information they have researched into writing their own guide to the landmarks they have chosen and producing their own leaflet. We hope to share this across the Key Stage via Teams! Now we are such experts with what happened during the Great Fire of London, the children will order events using a timeline. Please look out for homework for both topic and spelling on our Microsoft Teams online platform, download the app to your phone for quick access. We hear that some parents are having problems viewing documents, so we are also posting homework to our Year 2 webpage on the school website. Please keep letting us know if you have any issues. More year group news...

Year 3 We have had an interesting week finding out about the crown-of-thorns starfish. Next week, we will be using our new understanding of the impact of fishing on the coral reefs to create our own persuasive scripts to persuade people to choose sustainable fishing. We will also become film producers and directors when we use the iPads to create stop motion film clips to accompany our persuasive scripts. Within our Maths learning, we will begin to focus on Addition and Subtraction. We will be using mental methods to add single-digit numbers to three-digit numbers. This will draw on the learning from Y1 and Y2 where children focused on number bonds - any additional practice of these at home will be invaluable e.g. the numbers that make 10 (3+7, 5+5), the numbers that make 8 (7+1, 4+4) etc. We have enjoyed seeing the children achieve well in their AR quizzes and have been encouraged to see more children reading at home - thank you for your support with this. Don't forget that our termly topic homework is listed as an assignment on MS Teams - if you have any trouble accessing this please see your child's teacher.

Year 4 In Year 4 next week, we move into one last week of understanding number in our final sessions on the crucial topic of place value. We will zone in on counting in 25s, spend some time looking at negative numbers and consider how to read and calculate problems involving Roman numerals! In English we will be using all of the skills that we have developed over the last two weeks to write a persuasive script about the Crown of Thorns starfish problem. Alongside this, we will be using our topic sessions to learn how to create a stop motion animation. At the end, we will use the skills we have learnt to create our own animation about overfishing. In addition to this exciting project, we will continue to care for our sea monkey babies, practice our djembe drumming skills and enjoy a second session of Football Golf with Mrs Walpole!

Year 5 This week, Year 5 thoroughly enjoyed finishing our second reading text 'The Scarab's Secret' by Nick Would. We left the children on a cliff-hanger each day and their sounds of disappointment showed us how much they wanted to read on! We also had a great spelling session this week, in which we were separating words from the Year 5 & 6 word list in to syllables to help us learn the spellings. Did you notice your child using this strategy whilst learning spellings at home? We have started to award children with their pen licence. In order for your child to earn theirs, they need to join their handwriting consistently and neatly. In Maths, we have concluded our Place Value learning with a focus on negative numbers and roman numerals and will now be working through an Addition and Subtraction unit of learning. In our topic sessions this week, the children have chosen a famous pharaoh to research in order to create a profile about them. We would like to remind you that topic homework for Term 1 is due to be uploaded via 'Assignments' by 22nd October. We are expecting to see evidence of at least one outcome. Thank you for your continued support.

Year 6 The children have been busy completing their autobiographies and learning about a variety of strategies for multiplication and division. Next week, we will write our own 'Identity Poems' and investigate multiples, factors and prime numbers. We will also start a two week reading block about road safety to complement our Bikeability sessions. Each child has designed their own face covering as part of our Identity topic. For this Monday (12th October), they will need to provide some breathable fabric for their face covering as well as items to embellish it, such as sequins, buttons and thread (if they would like a particular colour). We will provide a small variety of material, needles and some coloured thread but we are sure the children would prefer to be able to select their own resources. Remember to read the letters about Bikeability, which starts next week. Year 6 children have always enjoyed this opportunity to get out in the fresh air and develop their skills.



Your Reception to Year 6 child, they are eligible for a Free Nasal Childhood Flu Vaccination. It is anticipated that this will be delivered in schools between October 2020 to December 2020, this will be administered adhering to all up to date

Flu vaccination is one of most effective interventions we have to reduce pressure on the health and social care system which is going to be more important than ever this year. For this reason, it is essential we deliver the vaccine to as many children as possible to prevent the spread of infection to those most at risk in society. 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
Prospective Reception 2021/22 School Visits
