Year Group News

Foundation Stage Well, Julia Donaldson has done it again! The children have been enthralled as we have introduced her latest book, 'The Smeds and the Smoos'. It has a very modern theme and explores aspects of 'British Values' with a focus on equality, embracing difference and rejecting discrimination. This is all done in a delightful story - think Romeo and Juliet for a 4 year old! The children will be encouraged to celebrate what makes them who they are and what makes their classmates individual. Creatively, they will be using previously taught skills to mix specific colours. There will be investigation of adult and baby animals as well as looking at the names and features of different planets. They will be designing far off planets, creating rockets to travel there and imagining what the aliens that live there might look like. We hope that you are enjoying listening to your children read independently with the new RWI scheme and have been blown away by their skills!

Year 1 We are loving learning all about Castles and next week we will be continuing writing non-chronological reports and we'll be thinking more about knights. In our DT Sessions, we will be finishing off our cereal box castle models by adding a moving drawbridge and portcullis, as well as painting and evaluating them. In Maths we will be adding. We will be exploring how you can adjust a sum such as 8+4 and make it easier to find the total by changing it into 10+2. In our RWI phonics and reading sessions we will be continuing with the sounds and ditties/books relevant to our group. Please ensure your child has their RWI reading pack on the correct day.

Year 2 The children in Year 2 will be learning the spelling rule for 'le' by rainbow writing, bubble writing and pyramid writing the words before putting them into silly sentences. In Maths, the children will be continuing their learning on multiplication by focusing on the 2x, 5x and 10x tables improving their rapid recall and finding answers at random. Next week, we will be completing our 3 week unit on 'Rapunzel' with the children planning and writing their own version of the familiar traditional tale. For our Tower topic, the children will be answering questions about parts of a castle and their uses, they will be looking at and ordering castles through the ages and finally they will be building their own towers to measure, using multi link. Please could you continue to read with your child daily, recording any reads into their diaries and bringing the diaries into school for us to celebrate.

Year 3 We have continued to look at the Firework Maker's Daughter and have enjoyed working together to create our own version of Lila meeting the fire spirit. Next week we will build on this to write individual versions of the story. We have begun to understand how and why volcanoes are formed and what causes them to erupt and for earthquakes to occur. Next week in Maths we will be focusing on dividing two digit numbers by one digit numbers using maths equipment to help us. In our games lessons we are using our map skills to take part in orienteering activities.

Year 4 After lots of practice with division this week, we will be using our knowledge to solve a range of problems involving these skills. Later in the week, we will be moving on to area. In English, we will continue to produce our own leaflets, explaining the importance of keeping our mouths healthy and advising others of how to look after their teeth and gums. For Science, we will be following our food's journey through the digestive system; learning how it is processed on the way, and in P.E. we will continue practising balancing on a line and using these skills to devise sequences with a partner or small group.

Year 5 This week, Year 5 have been writing fantasy stories using the features identified from our model text 'Tom's Midnight Garden'. In our reading sessions, we have finished 'Diary of a Time Traveller'. Whilst reading this book, the children have developed their ability to distinguish between fact and opinion and answered questions about what they have read. In Maths, we have continued to learn the formal methods for multiplication. Once again, some children's confidence when using these methods is hindered by their ability to recall multiplication facts quickly, so we would appreciate your continued support in improving this. 5C have been extremely lucky with the weather for Outdoor Learning this week. 5S will start their outdoor experience next week.

Year 6 Next week, Year 6 will begin to learn about percentages including finding percentages of amounts and identifying equivalent fractions, decimals and percentages. In English, the children will be writing their hidden secret stories which they have been working towards for the past few weeks. Reading lessons will be focused around the book 'Stone Girl Bone Girl' and the children will use their knowledge of the VIPER reading skills to develop their understanding of the text. In topic, we will continue our learning related to Darwin's Delights and next week the children will plan a science investigation linked to adaptation.
