Summary of PPG spending plans for 2013/14

- We provided additional support for Service children and their families when joining our school by having settling-in interviews and follow-up liaison with staff / families as required. Service children had catch-up and keeping-up interventions to narrow the gaps in their learning. This good practice has been shared with all children who join the school from other schools.
- We funded a Parent Support Adviser to advise and support families in need, to lead the HMS Heroes group and liaise with Service families and agencies.
- We paid for Membership of HMS Heroes.
- We were able to fund additional administration time to support the admission and transition of service families and liaison with other schools.
- We provided expert support for children who have emotional and social barriers to learning and succeeding.
- We were able to fund additional SENCO support for Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1.
- We provided in-school expert support for children with speech and language difficulties from the Foundation Stage onwards.
- Children who did not pass their Y1 phonics threshold were given additional support at the start of the school year.
- Children in Year 2, including those entitled to free school meals, had additional teaching support to improve their language learning.
- Children in Years 3 and 4 had additional interventions by their classteachers to close the gaps in their writing.
- Children in Years 5 and 6 who are very able in Maths had additional lessons to help them achieve well above national expectations.
- We were able to subsidise the Mathletics subscriptions children in Years 5 and 6 who were Service children or entitled to free school meals. We also subsidised the School Pupil Tracker assessment programme for these children.
- Children whose parents' income deems them to be entitled to free school meals had their residential experiences subsidised.
- We were able to purchase additional Maths and Literacy resources to accelerate learning.
