This week's year group news...

Reception All things beachy will continue to be the inspiration for our learning this week in Reception. The children will consider pollution and discuss ways in which we can all help to keep our beaches and the creatures who live there free from ill effects of pollution. They will create information posters to share this message. Another discussion point will be looking at day trips to the beach in the past and in the present and spotting similarities and differences. Having gathered plenty of information about rockpool creatures, they will create their own little rock pool habitats in junk modelling. Physical Friday will see us creating movements to represent a range of seaside creatures and playing 'movement bingo'. The children will also explore 'floating and sinking', making simple predictions about a range of items and explaining their thinking before testing and recording their results.

Year 1 As we enter week 5 of the final term, children are beginning to become quite tired. Luckily, we have some exciting learning going on to motivate them and spur them on to keep working hard. The children made some fantastic fruit kebab wands this week. They tasted as delicious as they looked. Next week, we will still be thinking about instructions and will focus our thoughts onto the steps required to make a jam sandwich. We are excited to also take on the role of a witch or a wizard-I wonder what interesting ingredients might go into a special witches' brew? We hope they won't be turning their teachers into toads! In maths, we continue to learn all about time, learning to read half past times. We also think about units of time – seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months etc. Lots of language around ordering days of the week and months of the year and estimating and measuring time using stopwatches. We loved our science this week all about bubbles. If children would like to continue experimenting with different bubble wands, our special 'bubble recipe' was – ¾ bucket of warm water, 1 cup of washing up liquid and ¾ cup of sugar or glycerine. The sugar is to give the bubble strength. We wish you all a happy and fun weekend!

Year 2 are enjoying the sunshine and having a wonderful time making muck, mess and mixtures! Next week in maths, we will be subtracting and using our number bond knowledge to help us complete calculations. In English we are creating our own creepy recipes in preparation for a spooky party. The children will be using imperative verbs to write instructions on how to make their creepy creations. We are continuing to explore Islam in RE and will be naming body parts as part of our RSE lessons. Science next week will be all about bubbles! We will be experimenting with bubble sizes and shapes. Please can we remind parents that children need to have a drink, sunhat and sun cream applied each day.











More year group news...

Year 3 & Year 4 The Year 3 and 4 children enjoyed finding out about cowboys this week and continued to work hard with all their learning. Next week, we will continue exploring the story 'How to make a cherry pie and see the USA' by Marjorie Priceman. The story is unique in that it is both fiction and non-fiction. The story contains a traditional recipe for a cherry pie, so we will be sending the children home with the recipe this weekend. Please let us know if you get the chance to make it and pop some photos on MS Teams. In Writing we will continue exploring the 'cowboy' and 'Wild West' theme. The focus will be on the use of non-standard English 'Yeeha!' By the end of the week children will have planned their own cowboy adventure. Y3 Mathematicians will continue investigating 'Time' and work on the 24 hour clock. Year 4 Mathematicians will be revisiting multiplication and division.

And finally, in our electricity Science lessons children will continue investigating conductors and insulators.

Year 5 This week, Year 5 have continued their learning journey about the changes that happen to our bodies during puberty. Again, It would be great if you could check in with your child to see if they have any questions that they would like to discuss with you at home. We will still have our question box for the children to be able to ask questions if they would prefer to do so anonymously. In English, the children have begun a new unit of work - diaries. We have been using our model text - a diary of a Tudor fishwife - to pick out key features and have begun to research some of the worst Tudor jobs, ready for our own diary entries next week. Our spelling lesson this week focused on the next set of Y5/6 words, looking at i and I words. In Maths, we have been learning about geometry, where we have learnt about coordinates in the first quadrant. We have also begun to translate and reflect some shapes in the first quadrant, recording the coordinates of the shape's vertices. In our topic sessions, the children have been learning about Tudor clothing! We have learnt that it takes quite a lot of effort and money to dress as a wealthy Tudor. We have had great fun designing our own Tudor costumes with lots of embroidery and ruffs. Please continue to encourage your child to read and complete AR quizzes at home. My Maths homework has also been set to be competed each week.

Year 6 Our Year 6 children have been busy filming our School of Rock production. Thank you for sending them in with outfits and supporting them in learning their lines. Please could all children 'rock up' (please see examples) a spare school shirt ready for next week and have it in school from Monday. In our Darwin topic, the children have plotted the route of HMS Beagle and started researching the Galapagos Islands. Our PSHE has been focused on learning about puberty and conception and we have been impressed with the children's maturity. Please reiterate our key message that any questions should be directed towards a trusted adult and not Google. Have a lovely weekend everyone.
