This week's year group news...

Reception The heart-warming story of 'Sally and the Limpet' by local author, Simon James will provide inspiration for learning in Reception next week. The children will learn about the creatures who inhabit the rockpool and how they adapt to their habitat. They will research and write factual sentences about a chosen rockpool creature. The children will also create their own limpet shells using the art of wax resist and will then imagine that they are Sally in the story. We will use the 'hot seat' method of encouraging children to respond in character to questions so that they can demonstrate empathy for character and understanding of the events in the story. We will explore the importance of the conservation and protection of our beaches and the children will be invited to design and create information posters to promote this message. In junk modelling, there will be an opportunity for the children to use their skills acquired over the year to equip themselves for a day at the beach as they make flip flops, sun hats and picnic baskets using recycled materials. As always, daily phonics and quick maths sessions will ensure that the children are reading and writing happily and independently as well as securing a healthy interest in number and pattern. We hope that you are starting to feel excited about our Reception assemblies which will take place on Thursday 30th June and Friday July 1st.

Year 1 This week we have enjoyed writing our own description of our fantasy schools. We have been recognising different coins and their values. Next time you go shopping, maybe you could have a look at this in a real-life context. We have continued to learn about what life was like in the Victorian times. This week we have focused on the changes that have taken place. We have been discussing this using the 'would you rather?' game. It's safe to say we are happy with the changes! As the weather is getting warmer please take the time to check jumpers (including PE kits) are clearly named. Please make sure children come to school wearing a sun hat and sun cream. Whilst we cannot apply sun cream for the children, they are allowed to do this themselves at lunchtime. Year 2 have enjoyed our learning around the Julia Donaldson story 'The Snail and the Whale'. We spent time last week learning the story and have been practicing retelling parts of the text. This week we have been developing our writing skills and have been working together to write our own class version of the story where a tiger and an ant strike up an unlikely friendship. Next week, we will be writing our versions of the story where we will choose our own main characters and the adventures that they go on. We have been developing our knowledge of telling the time over the past week and are much more confident with telling the time to the nearest quarter of an hour. We will continue this learning to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes and to begin to calculate duration. Any practice that you are able to do with that at home using both analogue and digital clocks will be useful. It would also be lovely to see more children wearing watches in and out of school to encourage them to use their new found skills. As part of coastline topic we have been finding out about the lifeboat stations around the UK and how the RNLI save people's lives. We have also been looking at the physical features of our coastline and have learnt about Saltwick Nab. Next week, we will be thinking about tourism around the UK coastline and why people visit the coastline.

Year 3 have a busy week next week. Continue learning about the ancient Romans and what life was like in Britain for the Celts. In Maths, we are continuing to learn to tell the time. We really appreciate that you have been helping with 'time-telling' at home. We will be reading a Roman myth and will make predictions and explore character emotions. In Writing, children will be reading a book called 'Botanicum' by Katie Scott and Kathy Willis. They will be looking at the features of non-fiction texts and learning how to make notes. Year 4 A big well done to all the Year 4 children who have now completed their end of year assessments and the government's multiplication check this week. In maths they will now be learning how to draw and interpret line graphs, and solving problems involving these. In R.E., we will be examining religious and secular ways to make the world a better place and in computing we will examine algorithms used to crack codes as well as considering how to protect ourselves online with the use of secure passwords. Having examined hierarchical systems in Ancient Egypt, we will now be examining the role of a pharaoh more closely and thinking about whether we would have liked to fulfil that job description! In science we will continue investigating light and learn how to stay safe in the sun which we hope to see a lot of in the coming weeks! In literacy, we move to an exciting new unit based on newspaper reports before the children carry out their own research about Tutankhamun. Plymouth Armed Forces Day 2022 & Military Kids Club

This weekend sees the welcome return of Plymouth Armed Forces Day with activities and events taking place on Plymouth Hoe. More details here Plymouth Armed Forces Day 2022.

As part of these celebrations, Pete Ogburn's memorial bench for military families will be unveiled on the Hoe. Pete Ogburn's dedication and support for the city's military families, over many years, is appreciated by countless children, young people and service families, within Plymouth and across the region. Without Pete, the national network of Service & Veterans' children would not exist and be the success it is today. Pete's involvement with MKC Heroes came when he accompanied his wife, Heather, a Senior Education Officer in Plymouth (with responsibility for military families), to a meeting of 40 local school children. They met to discuss their lives, what military service was like for children, and what would help them. During the discussion, one child said; "Why can't we have one of the flags Sir, like the old men in blazers have? We could get together and have a parade and be a club?" Others joined in, saying they could set up clubs in every school in the United Kingdom and beyond, so that everywhere they went they would have a friend. Pete took up the challenge and devised a plan to help her enable schools to create clubs that the children named Her Majesty's Schools Heroes (HMS Heroes). With the support of the Royal British Legion, HMS Heroes became Military Kids Club Heroes (MKCH) and Pete was the driving force; accessing funding for grants; being the treasurer, secretary, webmaster; competition designer and deliverer - organiser of anything and everything MKCH and so much more. Pete Ogburn's memorial bench will be unveiled at 3.30pm on Plymouth Armed Forces Day 2022. The bench will be located near the flagpole above the Belvedere (wedding cake) almost opposite Elliott Terrace. All are very welcome to attend.
